

NEWS FROM THE CHURCHES

ST JOHN'S URC



Revd Peter Ball

On Sunday 9th July it was good to again welcome Revd Peter Ball to lead our morning worship. Peter will be known

to many folk across the pastorate and was one of our previous ministers.

Since 2017, Peter Ball has been working Westminster College, Cambridge in Director of Church Resource Development. Peter leads the college's

wider remit of being a Resource Centre for Learning for the whole denomination, in addition to taking his full part in college life alongside his other teaching staff colleagues. He works closely with Synods and their Training Officers and Mission Enablers, as well as serving the denomination as part of the Walking the Way Steering Group and the Stepwise Task and Finish Group.

Peter trained at Westminster (1991-94) before ordination. He has had pastorates at Sawston Free Church, Little Abingdon and of course St John's URC Ipswich. Before taking up his post at Westminster, he was Mission and Training Officer for the URC's Eastern Synod.

Peter will be retiring later this year. His wife Catherine, also an active URC minister, will be retiring later. We understand that Peter has a long list of jobs to complete after his retirement and prior to Catherine's, many of which will revolve around their home in Saxmundham.

Buildings



The building at St John's, as with all of our church buildings, requires regular attention and maintenance. Although it's the

newest building in the pastorate, being completed in the 1980s, it is showing some signs of wear and we have had to deal with a number of urgent matters over the last few months.

These have included a leaky gutter and roof in the sanctuary, directly above the sound desk which, thankfully avoided damage and the cost to repair the problem was lower than we feared. However we have had a failed, and leaking cold water tank which put the building out of action, with no water for drinking or flushing lavatories, for several days — this was resolved quickly but was costly. To cap it all we have also had to repair a radiator and attend to problems with one of the upstairs toilet facilities.

Over the last few months we have been working to repair and repaint the external

fire escape stairs leading from the upper hall to the main car park. This work is now nearing completion. The structural elements were completed by a professional provider and the rest of the work, involving hammering, wire brushing, removal of debris and painting has been carried out by church volunteers.

A huge thankyou is due to the Buildings Team and the many other volunteers who have worked so hard to attend to the problems. The church is grateful to everyone who plays a regular part in the cleaning and maintenance of the premises.

The remaining matter which needs our attention is the front garden which was damaged by an ambulance avoiding a collision. Thankfully the density of the plants meant that the ambulance came to a halt without causing damage to the building itself. We are now awaiting the insurance payment and planning how best to reinstate and eco-friendly front garden.

Ukraine 2 Felixstowe



The church continues to support the work of this important project including the provision of "The Hub"

(our former choir vestry). The needs of our Ukrainian guests have shifted over time. Some of the guests have returned to Ukraine, despite the ongoing conflict. Some have moved out of Felixstowe due to the location of work and accommodation.

A key focus moving forward will be raising money, not so much for the guests who are in the UK, although we will not loose sight of their needs, but for sending to Ukraine to provide vital support and resources for those who face the day-to-day challenges of the war. We hope to be able to support in fundraising helping to facilitate opportunities for this purpose.

One key way in which folk are able to support our Ukrainian guest is by engaging in conversations, in English, to help them gain confidence in the language. Felixstowe URC have been hosting a series of "Coffee, Cake, Craft and Chat" (C4) sessions, organised by U2F volunteers. The first three sessions, held on Sunday afternoons, have focussed on producing (crocheting) toppers for some of our local pillar boxes to be displayed to mark Ukraine Independence Day on 24th August. Any folk who would like to come along to support with conversation, practical skills or catering are always welcome.

As the war in Ukraine rages on with no sight of a swift or easy conclusion, we must continue to pray, support and encourage in any way we can to help the people there.

Project40Seven



The shop premises adjacent to the church on the Church Square side are the base of a

new and exciting community project for Leiston. Named after the address of the building (47 High Street) — the project includes a community café, a community pantry, arts and crafts for sale and many activities. The project, part of Creative Leiston, also organises regular events for the community, including live music in Church Square.

The Church is pleased to support the project including in providing additional space for activities within our premises. This will include such things as a Repair Café – something which is becoming increasing popular wherever they are established.

Part of the project, "The Leiston Pantry" – a means of offering food, often with limited shelf life for very low price, has seen high demand. Along with the work of our own Food Bank there are many folk making use of the resource during these challenging times. Whilst it is not a cause for celebration that such things are in demand, it is at least encouraging that folk are able to find this help. We are looking to work in partnership with the pantry to support one another in of food provision items the complimentary rather than a competitive Any donations of produce or money for either or both projects would be extremely welcome.

Building In Use



We are continuing to enhance the facilities we have to offer when making our premises available for other

users. We have recently ordered new curtains for the hall and are hopeful that the blinds which cover the bi-folding doors leading to the Church Square will be repaired and replaced. We have also purchased a new shelving unit so that we can sort the books we make available for sale and provide storage for the various toys we have for use by the children who visit.

We are planning to declutter and dispose of a number of things to make better use of the space and make it more attractive. As with many church buildings, things tend to accumulate over time so we are taking the opportunity to tidy and make better use of the storage space we have available.

There have been a number of new bookings come in including a Pilates Class, currently holding a six-week trial to see how things work out and a local theatre group will be using the building for their regular rehearsals. Other enquiries have been received.

On Sunday 4th June, the Children and Families Department of URC Eastern Synod organised a Praise Party for children (of all ages!). The party was led by



Dougie Dug Dug, aka Doug Horley. The party was hosted by Christ Church, Braintree. This was an ideal excuse for a girl's day out with my two granddaughters, Harper (7) and Emma (11). We were joined by Emma's friend Bella (11).

Upon arrival we were warmly welcomed and taken into the large worship area. The dais had been "converted" to a stage and the team were preparing. I helped to arrange chairs into a large semi-circle leaving a spacious clear area for children (and some adults) to sit on the floor.

Doug welcomed everyone and explained, with video clips, that bubbles were created

by God and showed us how God used bubbles in creation. We learned that penguins store bubbles in their feathers, releasing them to provide "jet propulsion" for fast swimming. Another clip showed whales blowing bubbles to encircle a shoal of fish, trapping them before scooping up a large mouthful.

Between the clips Dougie led us in prayers of praise and thanksgiving and led us in some lively action songs. By this time, I had fully embraced my inner child.

It was next time for some bubble making. Dougie blew some large bubbles which floated above the gathered group. Water pistols were produced to shoot some of them down. A few folk got rather wet but this didn't dampen the mood.

There followed bubble popping with amusing sound effects, more actions songs and praise and more facts about bubbles. Various volunteers experienced having hats of bubbles built on their heads, bubble rockets launched from their heads. Bubbles were filled with helium and sent way up to the ceiling with cheers as they reached their destination. Others were filled with smoke and there were even bubbles within bubbles.

Finally, the time came for the really big bubbles with more volunteers coming forward. Some were actually placed inside giant bubbles where they discovered that they could blow against the wall of the bubble and a small bubble would burst out from it with the child still safely inside. The final bubble accommodated two children.

The Praise Party ended with more singing and dancing to the accompaniment of a shower of hundreds of bubbles. After warm applause for Dougie, we were invited into the hall to share in refreshments including drinks, snacks and cakes. The girls quickly found a space at the end of a table and tucked in! Tea, coffee and biscuits were provided for the adults – much appreciated after all the dancing and excitement.

As we were leaving the church we stopped at a small stall selling some of Doug's CDs. I bought a set of CDs so we can learn a few new, lively worship songs. Harper became the proud owner of a dolphin finger puppet. Doug was there and we were invited back into the church and each had a turn at standing inside a bubble – wow!



A MESSAGE FROM THE URC FINANCE TEAM

To: All members and adherents of United Reformed Churches and our Local Ecumenical Partnerships

Dear Friends,

When will normal service be resumed? As we are writing this letter and closing off the URC's accounts for 2022, the country is still torn with industrial disputes, mostly notably with Health Service workers, rail industry workers, teachers etc. etc. Whatever your view as to the wisdom or justice of such action, we suspect all of us are affected by the disruption to some degree.

In church life too, are we back to "normal life"? Some churches no doubt have returned to something like their pre-Covid level of activity and attendance numbers. Quite a few have recommenced their activity but find their numbers have reduced. Some churches have found re-opening too difficult and have decided to close.

Whatever the "new normal" was to be, we suggest its arrival has (like many trains) been disrupted, delayed, or cancelled all together.

The URC's finance officers had concerns that the late arrival of the return to normality would impact very significantly on the giving to the M&M Fund in 2022. However, the churches responded magnificently and the giving to M&M was £600,000 ahead of budget. It was also only 2.5% down on 2021's result.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2022 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

With normal service not yet resumed, 2023 is not going to be an easy year either. We now have the added disruption of high inflation, pushing up wages and overhead costs. As the Spirit directs and as our means allow, can the churches once more respond to the call of our gracious, loving and evergenerous God?

The churches of the Ipswich and East URC Pastorate are part of the Eastern Synod of the United Reformed Church. The Synod has a number of area partnerships in place. We are part of the South Suffolk Area Partnership (SSAP).

The SSAP currently includes nineteen local In addition to the five congregations. churches in our pastorate, these include: Christ Church LEP (Ipswich), Whiting Street St Edmunds), Clare. Haverhill. (Bury Hadleigh, Monks Eleigh, Framlingham LEP, Christchurch LEP (Needham Market), Southgate LEP, Stowmarket, Haughley, Stowupland, Mendlesham and Debenham.

We currently have four stipendiary ministers in post, Revd David Rees, Revd Adam Earle in our pastorate, Revd Neil Coulson who serves Christ Church (Ipswich) and Revd Robert Sheard who serves the Central Suffolk Churches including and surrounding Stowmarket. We also work with some of our Methodist colleagues, serving the LEPs including Revd Rita Carr and Revd Saul Tadzaushe.

Farewell to Revd Bryn Rickard

In June, Revd Bryn Rickard moved on from Hadleigh to take up a mission post in Oxford. We extend our thanks and appreciation to Bryn for all he did whilst ministering in Hadleigh and, not least of all, for serving as Interim Moderator to the pastorate during the appointment of Revd Adam. We pray that he and his family settle well into their new roles and context.

We pray for Hadleigh and the other churches currently in vacancy (some for a considerable period) as discussions take place. The Eastern Synod are working to establish a new model for deployment of ministers in future but this will take time and requires careful consideration.

URC General Assembly 2023

As I still count as a "new" minister, (I think I can get away with that excuse for three years!), I was invited to attend the 2023 General Assembly of the United Reformed Church – this is the largest council of the denomination. I attended as one of about ten representatives of the Eastern Synod which also included my fellow "new minister" Revd Mark Hayes from Thaxted URC.

General Assembly met from Friday 30th June to Monday 3rd July at The Hayes Conference Centre in Swanwick. This was an ideal setting with comfortable accommodation, good food and facilities. The one slight disappointment was that the air conditioning in the main hall was not working.

General Assembly was attended by several hundred representatives from each of the thirteen URC Synods plus ecumenical delegates who were invited to be full participants in the proceedings. Some additional folk were also able to join via Zoom including some of the speakers.

Assembly opened with worship and we then proceeded to business. There were a wide range of topics addressed over the four days and we attended to a considerable number of resolutions.

The "decision making" process at Assembly is somewhat complex and relies on consensus. Each representative is issued with three cards, Orange, Blue and White. When invited to do so by the Moderator, we indicated with our orange card if we were

"warm" to accepting a particular proposal or with our blue card if we were "cool" to and idea and wanted to make further representation or ask further questions. The white cards were used when the consensus indicated that all were ready to proceed and resolutions were passed by a two-thirds plus majority.

Some of resolutions which proved more challenging or needed additional work were referred to a "facilitation" group. The groups made further proposals at later sessions and resolutions were then considered, consensus sought and votes conducted.

The full collection of papers and resolutions and minutes of General Assembly can be accessed on the URC website. Of particular interest would be the work of the URC Church Life Review Group. This includes the Theos Report about the URC completed by an independent group. A copy of this report can also be found on the URC website. Search for the URC Theos report entitled "The United Reformed — A Paradoxical Church at a Crossroads". It makes very interesting reading.

One particular point to note is the induction of the new Moderator of General Assembly for 2024 — the URC's first black and ethnically-minoritised woman Moderator - the Revd Dr Tessa Henry-Robinson.

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Ordained in 2018, Dr
Henry-Robinson has
responsibility for four
congregations in the
East London Group, a
multi-culturally diverse
constituency. Tessa's

induction is a proud moment in the life of the denomination.
