

David writes:

Christmas: Celebrating Jesus, the Light of the World

As the days grow shorter and the nights seem longer, Christmas arrives to fill our world with light. This season is a time when we put up twinkling lights on trees, electric candles in windows, and decorations that



brighten even the coldest, darkest evenings. But for Christians, the real light of Christmas doesn't come from decorations—it comes from Jesus.

In John 8:12, Jesus says, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." This statement, so bold and simple, carries the true meaning of Christmas. In Jesus, we find a light that guides, comforts, and sustains us. Christmas is the celebration of God stepping into our lives, bringing a light that darkness can't overcome.

If you think about it, the world into which Jesus was born wasn't all that different from ours. It was a time of division, hardship, and uncertainty. People longed for hope, for a sense of peace and justice. And in the quiet village of Bethlehem, God gave us that hope—not as a king on a throne, but as a baby, born into humility. This baby would grow up to be someone who lifted up the poor, who welcomed the outsider, and who stood up for justice. Jesus' light wasn't just a comforting glow like my Christmas tree; it was a transformative force.

For us today, Christmas is a reminder that we're invited to carry this light into the world. Jesus' light doesn't ask us to deny the darkness or pretend everything is perfect. Instead, it calls us to be people who offer compassion, kindness, and hope to others. Just as light spreads and dispels darkness, our actions, however small, can bring warmth and brightness to those around us.

So as we gather this Christmas season in numerous church services, concerts and in our homes, let's think about the ways we can share the light of Christ. Maybe it's by reaching out to someone who's struggling, standing up for someone who's overlooked, or simply being present with those we love.

This Christmas, may we let Jesus' light fill us and inspire us. And may we remember that even in the longest, darkest night, the light shines, reminding us that God is with us—Emmanuel.

BIBLE STUDY

Our monthly Monday morning Bible Studies in December and January will both be via Zoom at 10.30 am. On December 9th bring your thoughts about the joy and meaning of the Christmas story in our day and age and your choice of Bible reading, Christmas carol or poem.

It can be a favourite passage from the Old or New Testament or one that you puzzle over and would like to discuss. Or it could be a carol whose words sum up something of the meaning of Christmas for you or whose



words seem strange to your thinking. Please be prepared to read the Bible passage or give the reference, or to read the carol or poem and to briefly explain your choice. It will be good to share together and expand our understanding.

Our first meeting in the New Year will be on January 13thth when we shall be looking at the story of Jesus attending the wedding at Cana in Galilee and turning the water into wine. This story is recorded in John 2:1-11. It will be good to see you at one or both of the meetings and we would be delighted to welcome any who have not joined us before.

CARING FOR GOD'S CREATION

OUR CHURCH GROUNDS AS A HAVEN FOR NATURE

Our Church grounds are more than part of a place of worship—they are a sanctuary for God's creation. In our commitment to environmental stewardship, we are working to transform the land into a thriving habitat for local wildlife. From bug hotels and bird nesting boxes to a cozy hedgehog shelter, every corner of our grounds has a refuge for God's creatures.

This spring, we'll expand our efforts by planting wildflowers, aiming to creating a vibrant meadow to support bees, butterflies, and other pollinators. By managing our grounds thoughtfully, we're not only enhancing biodiversity but also living out our faith by nurturing the earth entrusted to us. Our aim is to make the area around our Church a testament of care and reverence for the natural world.













CASTLE HILL TAKING PART IN BIG GARDEN BIRD WATCH 2025

Our Church is registering to take part in the world's largest garden wildlife survey. In 2024, over 600,000 people took part.

The survey involves devoting just one hour between January 24th and 26th to watch the birds in your garden , or in our case the Church grounds, and tell the RSPB (Royal Society for the Protection of Birds) what birds have been seen. If very few birds or none at all, are observed that's also really useful information. Elaine and Arthur Thomas have offered to carry out our Church's Survey.

The results are vital in tracking the welfare of our British birds. In 2024 of the almost 1.5 million birds counted the House Sparrow was the most common followed by the Blue Tit, Starling, Woodpigeon and Blackbird.

CHRISTIAN AID AT CHRISTMAS NO ROOM FOR COMFORT AND JOY

This Christmas Christian Aid is highlighting the growing humanitarian crisis in South Sudan. There is no room for comfort and joy when you've left everything behind to survive. Driven by war in Sudan to a refugee settlement in South Sudan, families like Shede's who is depicted on our poster, urgently need our support. Shede faces a daily challenge to guard her daughter and granddaughter from hunger and malnutrition.



In Sudan, just like in the UK, visitors are often welcomed with a steaming cup of shai (tea). Preparing and sharing tea is a comforting ritual that fosters togetherness. Shede would serve tea in her home in Sudan but now she has had to leave everything behind. She

says, "I did not come with anything. I only came with these clothes on. The rest of my belongings were all left behind. No table, no teapot, no chair, no bed. Nothing."

The support programme delivered by Christian Aid is a vital lifeline. For families like Shede's, it offers the means to buy food and replace the essential belongings they've lost. It's a stark reminder, among the excess of Christmas here, that many of our global neighbours have made impossible choices and are enduring unimaginable loss and trauma.

As you sip your tea, why not plan to help support families like Shede's by making a donation to our Church Christmas Christian Aid appeal. There will be retiring collections at all our Christmas services from December 15th –29th. Christian Aid envelopes will be available.

This year the **Christmas Card Board** will be hung at the back of the Church. You are invited to add a card to all your friends at Castle Hill rather than send individual ones, and to put the money saved in the Christian Aid basket on the table at the back of the Church.
