

THE JOURNEY OF LENT: MORE THAN JUST GIVING UP CHOCOLATE

Lent is here again, starting on Ash Wednesday, this year on the 5th March. It's that time of year when we're all supposed to give something up—chocolate, crisps, wine, social media, or maybe even caffeine (if you're braver than me!). But is that really the heart of Lent? Or is there something deeper?

It seems to me that at its core, Lent is about reflection, renewal, and drawing closer to God. It's a journey, not a punishment. It's about making space—clearing away the clutter so we can focus on what really matters. Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness preparing for his ministry, and in some small way, we're invited to do the same. "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me" (Psalm 51:10).

A friend of mine once decided to give up negativity for Lent. Instead of cutting out a favourite food or soap opera, she challenged herself to stop complaining. Every time she caught herself moaning about the weather or grumbling about the traffic, or getting annoyed at her husband or children, she made a conscious effort to find something good instead. It wasn't easy, in fact at times it was almost impossible, but by Easter, she said she felt lighter—freer, even. It had shifted her mindset in a way she hadn't expected.

So maybe this Lent, instead of (or alongside) giving something up, we could take something on. A daily act of kindness. More time in prayer. Writing letters or emails to people who need encouragement. Volunteering. Actually attend a Lent course this year! Checking in on a neighbour. Something that draws us closer to God and to one another.

Ultimately, Lent isn't about self-denial for the sake of it—it's about transformation. It's about stepping away from the noise and making room for grace. And if that means still having the odd square of chocolate while choosing to be more patient, more compassionate, or more prayerful, then I reckon God will be just fine with that.

Whatever you decide this Lent, may it be a time of growth, peace, unexpected joy, and may it "... renew a right spirit within me."

FNKD UPDATES

It's the start of the school year in Uganda and we currently have 87 children living in the villages in North Kigezi Diocese on our sponsorship programmes. They all did so well at the end of last year, passing their exams and promoting to new classes and from Primary to secondary school. Three children took their O levels and have all passed – we are so proud and would like to thank everyone for making it possible for them to progress as it's only through sponsorship that these children can stay in school. The picture shows some of the children at Centre Day in Bucence receiving their books, pens, pencils and pads ready to begin the new term. They were so happy.

I had the great task of ensuring that the children were all placed in a setting to suit their needs, and they had what they needed. I look forward to meeting up with the children at their next Centre Day at Easter.

Our sewing training programme is coming to an end after running for a year. It's been a great programme – two of our sponsored children can now sew as well as 8 local ladies. They can now make school uniforms, dresses, shirts and trousers. One lady from Bucence Village, Emily, was given the opportunity to learn to sew through FNKD. Emily and her husband Laban were doing well with their three young children – they had built a small house but then Laban became ill and has Motor Neurone Disease, so life has

become very hard for them. Learning to sew has given Emily some hope. If anyone would like to help them a bit, please let me know.

The children in Bucence Children Centre are growing fast – Eunice reports that baby Robert is now constantly chatting and is very playful. The rest of the children are all at school. Three more of our children have promoted to Secondary School which now makes 5 of them and our eldest boy has just finished his first semester in Nursing training at Kissizi hospital. It was a massive task for Eunice to prepare her large Children Centre family of 26 plus her own four children to return to school – she really is an amazing lady.

Cards for Bucence Children Centre - to help raise a few small funds to help Bucence Children's Centre there are some handmade greetings cards for sale on the table in the church – there are some lovely cards and very reasonably priced.

On the evening of Saturday 22nd March, Mark and Fiona are holding a quiz evening to also help us to raise some funds for the Children's Centre. The last quiz night was a really good night – so if you would like to join in please sign up on the list in the vestibule. Teams of 6 to a table please.

I will be returning to Uganda on $3^{\rm rd}$ April for three weeks and value so much your prayers and support. For my journey, my health and strength – and I pray the Rat doesn't visit this time.

There is an urgent need for clean, safe, and hygienic toilets in Bucence and surrounding areas—not only indoors at the Children's Centre but also in villages and other communities.








EASTER MESSY CHURCH

GIVE YOUR BROKEN ITEMS A SECOND CHANCE AT THE SUFFOLK REPAIR SHED

Repairing the things we already own is a fantastic way to reduce waste, conserve natural resources, and lower our carbon footprint. Every item saved from the landfill helps protect the planet.



Before you throw away that faulty hairdryer or give up on a silent alarm clock, consider taking it to the **Suffolk Repair Shed**. Whether it's a broken radio, a torn teddy bear, or a worn-out kitchen appliance, the skilled volunteers there might be able to bring it back to life—saving you money and reducing waste in the process.

How It Works:

Repair sheds are popping up all over, and one of the closest is in **Martlesham**. If your item can be fixed, you simply make a donation of your choice. If it can't be repaired, there's no charge.

One member of the *Ipswich and East Caring for Creation Group* has used the service a few times and speaks highly of the experience. While not every item was repairable, most were given a new lease on life.

Unlike the professional restorers on TV, the Suffolk Repair Shed is run by **talented volunteers** rather than specialists

SPRING ON THE HORIZON IN THE SEASON OF LENT

The air is hushed with solemn grace, A time of waiting, slow embrace. Yet just beyond the barren trees, Spring whispers softly in the breeze.

The earth, though clothed in ashen grey, Prepares for life in bright array. The buds, though tight, begin to swell, A promise that the world knows well.

As fasting hearts in prayer reside, The rivers break from winter's tide. The dawn grows warm, the nights grow brief, And hope stirs deep beneath our grief.

For Lent, though wrapped in sacrifice, Prepares the soul for paradise. And as the Easter light draws near, Spring's song of life grows loud and clear.

DISCUSSION POINT

The poem above took three seconds to produce.

It was written using Artificial Intelligence {AI}. So could it be inspired by God? Again, I put the question to AI and in two seconds the answer came.

'AI itself isn't inspired by God, as it lacks a soul or spiritual connection. However, if a Christian prays for wisdom while using AI, God can work through their intentions. Like a painter's brush, AI is just a tool—it's the person using it who brings meaning. If an AI-generated poem reflects God's truth, it may still be part of His work.'

Observing Earth Hour shows that we care about God's creation by demonstrating respect for the world He entrusted to us.

CARING FOR CREATION PUSHING TOWARDS SILVER AWARD

If you notice a washing-up bowl partially buried in the soil at the back of the car park, don't be alarmed—it's not rubbish! It's actually a water source for the wildlife that visits our church grounds. This is just one small step in our journey towards achieving the Eco-Church Silver Award.

Another step was our church's participation in the **Big Garden Birdwatch**. On a chilly January afternoon, Arthur and Elaine Thomas spent an hour in their car at the back of the church, carefully counting the birds that landed in our grounds. Their sightings, which included 10 sparrows a white-collared dove and a blackbird, were submitted to the RSPB, contributing to this nationwide conservation effort.

Looking ahead, we've purchased wildflower seeds that will be sown once a section of ground has been prepared. This will help support pollinators and enhance biodiversity. These initiatives, along with our existing **bug hotels**, **bird nest boxes**, **and hedgehog shelter**, are simple yet meaningful steps. However, some targets are more challenging due to the nature of our church grounds.

Beyond caring for land and wildlife, the **Eco-Church Award** also requires us to meet goals in Worship & Teaching, Buildings & Energy, Community & Global Engagement, and Lifestyle. We are making good progress in all areas, but there is still more to do.

However, our eco journey isn't just about meeting targets—it's a heartfelt commitment to caring for God's creation. As a Christian community, we are called to take practical steps to protect the environment, and this responsibility belongs to all of us.

So, let's start with something simple that **everyone** can do! Why not take part in **Earth Hour** (advertised on the facing page) and show our shared commitment to protecting our planet?
