ALL ARE WELCOME?

It is always good to participate in a special time of worship. On Saturday 21st September I was privileged to play the organ, and David Rees to preach, at the Induction of Revd Robert Sheard as minister of Christchurch Needham Market. Our opening hymn was "Let us build a house where love can dwell." The chorus declares, sung with bold determination, "All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome, all are



This is not the first time that the question of welcome has echoed round my head and the subject has been a theme of many a ministers' pastoral letter. We all like to think of our churches as welcoming, but what does it mean to be a truly welcoming community of God's people? "All are welcome!" What are we really saying when we write these words at the foot of a poster advertising some event or time of worship? What does welcome mean?

Zach Lambert is a theologian and the lead pastor and founder of "Restore" a church movement which describes itself in these terms:

- · We are a church which locks arms with the community to help bring restoration to people and neighbourhoods in our city and around the world.
- · We don't have everything figured out, but we are on a journey of restoration through Jesus who loves people without prejudice or qualification. Restore is a place where you can be yourself, ask questions, and won't be pressured to conform to any stereotype.

That is quite a powerful and demanding "headline" to place at the top of the church's "About Us" page on their website. It gives a very clear sense of what welcome should mean even though it is a work in progress – joining with and embracing all the people around and loving without prejudice or qualification – no pressure to conform to someone else's idea of what a Christian should be like and an acknowledgement that we are not the holders of all the answers but fellow discoverers on a journey of faith.

I was alerted to Zach's ministry when I encountered the following challenge, posted by a friend, on a Facebook page:

There are two kinds of "everyone is welcome" churches:

- 1. Everyone is welcome to conform to that church's image of what a Christian looks like.
- 2. Everyone is welcome to fully embody the unique image God created them to be.


Run away from the first and run toward the second.

As we serve the call of God to make Christ known to all people, we have to learn to embrace all, as they are, to be welcoming to anyone and everyone, without caveat. Of course this is not restricted to the few that cross the threshold of our church buildings; the welcome of love extends to every moment and interaction, to everyone we encounter day by day.

In summarising God's law in Mark 12: 30&31 We are called to love God with all we are and "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." The word interpreted love here is one we've encountered before, "Agapé" – the love with which God loves, welcoming, caring, and deep. This is the love that Christ exposes in its fullness on the cross – unconditional, unreserved and undeserved.

Friends, let us seek to be welcoming as Christ welcomes, both as individuals and as the Church, the community of God's kingdom.

CHRISTMAS HAMPER GIFTS TO FAMILIES IN NORTH KIGEZI DIOCESE,

SOUTHWESTERN UGANDA

We have just launched our Christmas food hamper appeal for 2024, our 8th year. This food distribution programme has been well supported over the past years. Last year, an amazing 120 hampers were delivered to families living in extreme poverty throughout the villages in this mountainous area.

The current situation (Autumn 24) is not good – our fieldworkers are already telling us that they are finding children literally starving – we have just delivered an extra 23 sacks of cereal maize.

At our board meeting, held during my recent visit to Uganda, members from the child development department and probationary service gave feedback about the hamper programme that brought tears to my eyes. It was said 'if only you could be here with us as the hampers are delivered – people were crying with relief'. A great big thankyou was also sent to all of you for reaching out and sending this food at Christmas time.

Thank you so much for donations that have already come in this year. If you would like to donate a hamper, we would really appreciate it. We would like to deliver food to as many of the neediest families as we can throughout the month of December. Our team deliver the food directly into the hands of those who need it most and it really does provide a lifeline to families facing starvation.

We have increased the cost slightly this year due to increases in food and fuel prices – each hamper now costs £42.
