



HARVEST: A SEASON OF SHARING

When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest. You shall not strip your vineyard bare... you shall leave them for the poor and the alien: I am the Lord your God." Leviticus 19:9–10 (NRSV)

As the season of harvest has arrived, we are reminded not only of nature's abundance but of the sacred call to share it. The ancient words of Leviticus,



These verses are more than agricultural advice. They are a bold statement about equity, compassion, and community responsibility. God's instruction is clear: *Leave room for others*. Don't consume everything for yourself. Don't harvest right to the edge. Leave space so that those who are vulnerable, those who are strangers, those who have less, may also be fed.

In our modern world, where food normally comes from supermarkets and harvest looks different than it did in ancient Israel, the principle remains the same. How do we "leave the edges of our fields" today? Perhaps it means making space in our budget to support food banks, sharing our table with someone who is lonely, or advocating for policies that address food insecurity and economic inequality. Maybe it means simply pausing to notice who is in need and responding with love.

In another church, every Sunday one lady made a habit of hospitality. No matter how many chairs were around the table, there was always room for one more. If someone new turned up at church, a neighbour dropped by, or a student was far from home, they were invited to join the meal. The food stretched - sometimes miraculously - and no one left hungry. That table, filled with laughter and welcome, was her way of leaving the edges of the field for others.

At its heart, the harvest is not just a time to gather; it is a time to give. To recognise that what we have is not ours alone, but a gift meant to be shared.



In our church community, we live into this calling when we support the local food bank, host community meals or coffee mornings, and give generously to mission and the needy. We live into it when we listen, when we include, and when we open our doors wide.

This Harvest season, not just on Harvest Sunday, let us celebrate the goodness of creation not with closed fists, but with open hands. Let us be people who leave the edges - who make room - so that everyone might taste the blessings of God's table.



A Monthly Online Gathering to Explore and Discuss the Bible

2 Timothy 3:16-17(CEV)

¹⁶Everything in the Scriptures is God's Word. All of it is useful for teaching and helping people and for correcting them and showing them how to live. ¹⁷The Scriptures train God's servants to do all kinds of good deeds.

The Bible stands at the heart of the Christian Faith. Scripture is central in our worship and life together in the church. We are encouraged to read and explore God's Word regularly and to engage in understanding and relating its message to our day to day lives and service.

I would like to begin by thanking everyone so much for your continuous support to help us to reach out to God's Children in North Kigezi Diocese. It is really quite incredible to have been called to serve in such a faraway place and we really are making a difference and having an impact on the daily life and existence of the people there.

Thank you for contributions to the toilet project – we are doing well and with one big donation made and some smaller donations from the loose change boxes we are creeping towards our target of £5,556. We have so far raised £2,240.28. The immediate need is for a six-stance latrine block in the village of Maaya. Please keep saving that loose change as it mounts up, every penny makes a difference.

I would also like to thank you for saving your empty ink cartridges and for buying the homemade cards – all proceeds for these go directly into Bucence Children's Centre.





I would also like to say a massive thank you to the Car Boot Sale team. You have made our 28 children at Bucence Children's Centre overjoyed as now they have their own music box. They love to dance and sing along to the songs and let off all their pent-up energy and stresses – thank you!

Summer days are coming to an end and we are now into Autumn with

Christmas which is just around the corner. For the past few years, we have been running a food distribution programme by the way of a hamper of local Ugandan food – rice, sack of posho (maize flour), ground nuts, a large stalk of matoke and a nice plump chicken. This food is delivered by lorry by our staff during the month of December to very needy and struggling families in the villages where we (FNKD) work. Many people from Castle Hill URC have supported this programme. Last year you helped us to buy and deliver food to over 114 families. If you would like to help us again this year, we would be so glad – the price remains the same at £42 per hamper. Thank you so much

FLOWER DONATIONS WELCOME


Each week we are greeted with a fresh display of flowers on our communion table as pictured here.
